Welcome & Introduction

Cllr P. Balicki introduced himself and welcomed attendees to the Annual Parish Meeting

Apologies

Apologies were received from Cllr G. Barradell, Cllr H. Chambers, Cllr I. Stott, County Cllr Doug Dew and District Cllr David Mead.

Annual Review of the Parish Council Business – Chairman’s Report for 2021/22

Report from the Chairman of Hilton Parish Council – Cllr Peter Balicki

Last year’s meeting covered 2 years due to COVID but this year’s meeting only covers a year so my report will be shorter.

The Parish Council has continued to undertake its role and duties but in the year that will end on 31 March 2022 there have been a couple of major achievements which I would like to comment on.

Firstly, approval for a 24 hour ban on HGVs along the B1040 was approved by Cambridgeshire County Council. This has been something lobbied for in the village for a number of years and the success of the Parish Council’s Local Highway Initiative bid has been the culmination of all the work undertaken by various groups in the village over that period of time. I would like to thank everyone who has participated in whatever way they

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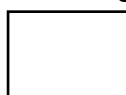
have over the years to help get this decision made. Hopefully, we will see this ban implemented in the next 3 months.

Secondly, the Parish Council was successful in securing a legacy grant from Highways England that allowed the work to be undertaken to repair the bank of The Ware along Graveley Way. The bank had been eroding over the years and when this was highlighted a few years ago it was clear there was going to be debate/dispute over who owned the bank and who was responsible for repairing it with costs of in excess of £30,000 quoted for its repair. The main body of work has been completed. There is some remedial work to be undertaken to look at surface water collecting on the road and again I am hopeful that this will be concluded in the next 3 months.

The Parish Council is responsible for some of the street lighting in the village, maintenance of ponds, ditches, trees, and grass cutting. Councillor Ian Stott must be thanked for his continued work regarding trees. Ian has been involved with the tree surveys on the green for more years than I am sure he would like to remember and has a knowledge of the trees around the village that is second to none. He is on the Green Open Spaces committee and helps to manage the maintenance contract and look at other areas of work that need attending to around the village. I would like to thank our maintenance contractor John Carter for continuing his work through the year. Additional thanks go to Duncan McMichael for the additional work he has undertaken at times. There has again been some work carried out on easier to access trees by various councillors saving the Parish some expenditure. Special thanks must go to Graham Barradell, Vice Chairman of the Parish Council for all the unpaid work he undertakes around the village tidying and maintaining areas of the green and playground on behalf of the village. Thank you, Graham, for this and your support over the year as Vice Chairman.

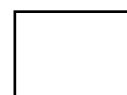
The firework display this year was one of the best. Attendance was high, perhaps as a reflection of people wanting to get out again after the couple of years of pandemic and the Parish Council would like to thank the firework team for putting on a great show, Feast Week for providing refreshments and Councillors and volunteers for manning the event and collecting takings.

As you will be aware the Parish Council also makes recommendations to Huntingdon District Council on planning applications via the planning committee. Graham Barradell and I attended meetings of the local Development Management Committee regarding development of the land at the top of Church End under a Rural Exception Housing scheme. The majority of parishioners who had expressed a view on this development had objected to it and we presented that view to the committee. At the first meeting the scheme was refused but the applicant lodged an appeal threatening legal action against Huntingdon District Council and at the second meeting this was approved despite it falling outside the Councils policy requirements for rural exception housing. The Parish Council looked at seeking a judicial review, but the overall cost involved in this procedure was prohibitive with no guarantee that the decision would be reversed. The Parish Council could have also been landed with the District Councils legal fees and it was decided not to proceed. It is a pity that a housing development can be foisted on a small development when clearly the



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parishioners have expressed views that they do not want it, it is turning agricultural land to development and is outside the line of existing development. We are not the only settlement to be affected in this way over the country and I feel it is a shame as there is clearly only one beneficiary with no thought for the communities affected.

Nicola Webster continues to serve the Parish Council excellently in her role of the Clerk. The council recognised that the work Nicola undertakes was difficult to complete in the allotted hours and so increased these to 12 hours per week from 10 this year. Nicola has ensured that the council meets its legislative requirements and at the beginning of the year ensured the requirements of online meetings were sorted out.

The councillors have been excellent over the year, and we were pleased to welcome Sarah Suckling as a councillor. As Chairman I have appreciated the support I have received from councillors and the clerk alike over the year and I would like to thank them all for their hard work and time in serving the village throughout the last year.

I would also like to thank County Councillor Doug Dew for his support in the LHI bid for the HGV ban and for his support on matters regarding the planning application.

I now look forward to receiving the reports from the Clerk and representatives of other groups within the village.

Parish Council Financial Report for 2021/22

Nicola Webster presented the accounts from 2021/22 in her role as Responsible Financial Officer. She noted that the accounts were incomplete as the financial year has not yet ended and therefore also unaudited.

Financial Year ending 31st March 2022

- The precept amount remained the same as the previous financial year at £30,600.
- The Council received a payment of £12,500 in return for granting an easement.
- The income from the Bonfire Night event was higher than expected at £2,319.68.
- The cost of payroll increased from £8,731 to £10,945. This is due to the Clerk's hours being increased from 10 to 12 per week and also the pension contributions.
- The cost of maintaining the cricket outfield increased to £900. This was due to the fact that there were ideal grass growing conditions which necessitated additional cuts throughout the year.
- The Council spent £365 on wood to replace the fence by the ditch near the Pavilion.
- The Council spent £2,050 resurfacing the path from the Church to Church Lane.
- The subscriptions appear low for 2021/22 due to the fact that the CAPALC invoice was paid in 2020/21.
- Utility costs have increased from £1,695 to £1,927. Whilst we have a fixed cost tariff for the street lighting energy (whose costs have remained the same), the cost of electricity for the Pavilion has increased from £117 to £165 and the cost of water from £65 to £97. There was also a payment of £162 for the energy supplied for the lighting in the churchyard which covered both 2019 and 2020.

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- The Council made several donations including £95 to the Community Garden for their insurance, £70 to Hilton WI for the engraved plaques on their bench, £200 to Spectrum and £60 to the Royal British Legion
- There was a significant legal spend of £1,000 for solicitor's advice in the planning matter regarding the proposed development of houses in Church End.
- The Council received a grant from Living Sport of £1,464 which was used to purchase sports equipment for parishioners to hire and run activities on the Green, such as Tai Chi and Keep Fit.
- The reserves have not yet been agreed by the Council, but if the recommended amounts are earmarked, the general reserves will be at £7,638, which is lower than the agreed 50% of precept.

2022/23 Financial Year

- The Parish Council has resolved to increase the precept to £31,550, which is an increase of £950 or 3.1%
- The tax base has increased from 450 to 455 (which reverses last year's decrease) which means that the effective precept increase is 2%.
- The tax base is calculated by looking at the equivalent number of band D properties in the Parish, adding the number of houses due to be built and taking away those properties in receipt of council tax support or single person supplement. In the case of Hilton, the tax base has been increased due to the decrease of properties in receipt of council tax support.

Reports from Village Groups including Hilton Town Trust and Hilton WI

Report from Cambridgeshire County Council – County Cllr Doug Dew (read by Cllr Peter Balicki)

Budget & Underspend

The new joint administration has set a balanced budget for the forthcoming year with just short of 5% increase, with 3% of that allocated to adults & young people social care.

Adults & Young People

These areas continue to be the areas of greatest demand on the council services. They have long been under funded, and it is hoped that the additional ring-fenced charge already mentioned will help in this area.

Communities & Social Mobility and Inclusion

This is a diverse committee that deals with many areas of social need throughout the County and also areas such as the libraries and hostels for victims of domestic abuse.

Highways

I was pleased to be able to support the villages aspirations to have the 7.5-ton limit increased to 24 hours a day. I am looking forward to it being implemented in the near



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future. Unfortunately, despite the fact that it looked otherwise we still do not have a full time Highways Officer allocated to the division. It is something I am not happy about and have complained to Senior Officers who are trying to resolve the issue but there seems to be a shortage of Highways Officers in the country!

A1307 / A14

There are still some legacy problems to be dealt with and these are being slowly resolved. Interestingly many if not most of the trees that have been planted along the new A14 appear to have died. The County Council recently passed a motion asking Highways England to sort this issue out.

Flooding

I have pushed via the County Council both Highways England and the Environment Agency regarding issues between Fenstanton and Hilton, around the new A14. This is ongoing and taking far longer than I had hoped for.

The County Council, as lead flood authority, has published its strategic flood plan which should go some way to assist in matters in the future.

Malcolm Lynn introduced himself as one of the PC Trustees and thanked the PC for nominating him. He also presented apologies from Phil Wood who is the Clerk.

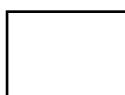
BACKGROUND

The village of Hilton benefits from land and assets endowed over the centuries. The most recent definition of the charities was confirmed by a Deed dated 1899, in which year the gross yearly income from land and cottages was £41.

We operate two Charities. The land and assets are held by the Estate Charity, the senior charity of the two.

The 1899 deed requires that half of the annual income of the Estate Charity goes to the Parish Church to be used for repairs to the building; the other half is paid to the second charity, the Town Charity to be spent for the general benefit of the village.

Both the Estate and Town Charities are administered by the Trustees and are chaired by the Revd David Busk.



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The Parish Council appoints two trustees, presently Malcolm Lynn and Rachel Lawton; and the Church appoints the other two trustees, currently Nick Sarkies and Rachel Wood. Phil Wood is the Clerk.

Trustees publish the purposes of the Charity in Spectrum each year, and the wider public is informed by the Charity Commission's Directories. An annual report is sent to the Charity Commission.

TOWN CHARITY REPORT FOR CALENDER YEARS 2021

At the beginning of 2021, the Town Charity held £20,970 in hand.

In 2021 income amounting to £5,000 was received from the Estate Charity & interest totalled £2.

Although the Trustees have no specific mandate, a mix of grants are made under the general terms of the Deed including capital grants, educational grants, grants to organisations directly serving the needs of Hilton.

Projects supported by the Town Charity in 2021 included:

The Town Charity had £20,862 in hand at 31/12/21 with an expected income for 2022 of £5,000.

Report from Hilton Community Garden Group – Aileen Murch

Aileen introduced herself. She advised that this time last year they were forming a committee and thanked Dr & Mrs Randall for their generosity in providing the land. They have dug, mulched, and planted and it was very rewarding seeing the fruit of their labours. They have also installed a new path and three new trugs along with native hedging, bird feeders and bird boxes. There is a blue tit family in residence near the small pond. There are also seating areas, floral displays and a wrought iron sundial. The group has been working

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together, sharing ideas and expertise, and striving to get the best for the garden. The committee is grateful to the many individuals who have donated time and money to the garden. Particular thanks go to the Chair Heather Chambers, committee members past & present, and Dr & Mrs Randall. They held a hugely successful summer event with 40 families attending with a tree trail, planting, and refreshments. They also held an autumn event, with pumpkin carving and autumn crafts. They have had a Cub group visit, two Duke of Edinburgh students who made a short film, and Cllr Simon Bywater of Huntingdonshire District Council. All visitors have said that the Community Garden is a real asset to Hilton village. They are not resting on their laurels, future projects include the erection of a polytunnel, and the installation of a whisky barrel pond. They are planning an event to enhance jubilee celebrations. Hilton Community Garden is your garden, and all are welcome, there might even be cake!

Report from Hilton WI – Sue Clark – President

As President of Hilton WI, I welcome the opportunity to once again provide a report of our doings for the past year.

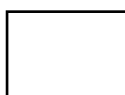
Last year I reported that the National Federation of WI’s had given each individual WI the flexibility to reduce their share of the annual membership and that as a result we were passing on the savings Hilton WI had made during the period of lockdown in full to our members. I was absolutely amazed and thrilled that ALL our members renewed their membership in April 2021. All 60 of them were on email which gave us strong base to continue keeping in touch with each other through this past year either by monthly zoom meetings, weekly tea-time chats and fortnightly Newsletters...or more recently with a return to face to face meetings.

We of course had to stay flexible throughout the year as occasionally a booked speaker succumbed to covid, but we’ve had interesting talks on about the “must see Street in Cambridge”, Papworth Brewery, Wood Green animal shelter all on zoom and then talks in person from an author, from the Refill Shop of Ikigai in St Ives and from Adrian Arnold who sailed around the world and we’ve held our AGM and Christmas party.

Our summer outing had been cancelled so, undaunted, we decided to travel independently in small groups to a local place of interest....in July ten of us enjoyed a guided tour by the Head Gardener of Burghley House to see his walled garden project, we plan to return this summer to see how he has progressed.

We held our annual Summer Buffet in the Village Hall in August following all covid regulations and safety precautions.

In September three of our members set up a Sunflower Trail throughout the village...the Sunflower is the emblem of the National Federation of WIs, the trail was to advertise Hilton



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WI and welcome new members. The anagrams on the Sunflower petals were quite a challenge and it was a long walk, but we had good feedback from participants

Last year's National Federation resolution was a drive to increase awareness of Ovarian Cancer. In November we ran an informative talk by an NHS Specialist Nurse which was open to all the community, and which raised £117.00 in donations for the Ovacom charity, and we had supportive comments from those local people whose lives have been affected by this silent killer.

A Hilton WI tradition is the bi-annual trip to the Thursford Extravaganza and after cancelling in 2020 over 50 members finally took the coach trip to Thursford in November 2021. In December we finished our Christmas Party by singing outside under the lovely Christmas Tree.

Our members stay very involved and supportive of village life, taking part in the sports on the green last summer, in the pantomime at Christmas and working in the Community Garden. In addition, one of our members, with the help of her husband, plants and maintains the lovely hanging baskets which bloom outside the Village Hall throughout the summer... Hilton WI funds this gift for the pleasure of the community.

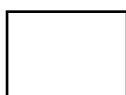
Our WI memorial bench had been vandalised some years ago and was no longer considered safe or suitable for use, however Hilton Town Trust very kindly agreed to fund a replacement memorial bench which was ordered and installed near the Maze by the Parish Council. The original bench is now in the Community Garden to be enjoyed by all. Both benches have plaques funded by the Parish Council...a very sincere thank you to the Town Trust for the bench and to the Parish Council for the plaques.

Our regular monthly groups have restarted, and we now meet in person for Drawing Group, Craft Club and Book Club.

In October we launched a Walking Group, it has got off to a slow start, but we have 5-mile walks planned each month through to October, open to anyone from the community.

During the summer we held our Monday Picnics on the Green. It was obvious how much members enjoyed meeting informally so when the weather became too cold to sit outside we introduced a Canasta Club. The club meets twice a month in the Village Hall and has been very successful, regularly attracting between 16-24 members.

We have gained six new members in the past year making a total of 66, which is wonderful..... but now that Hilton WI is running as normal we have had to increase our membership fee back to the pre covid amount. We think we offer great value for money and hope that most of our members will again renew their membership and continue their WI friendships. Finally, I am delighted that by all the Committee and members pulling



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together we have survived the challenges that covid threw at us to date and I hope that Hilton WI will continue strongly into the future.

Report from the Royal British Legion – Julie Briggs and Margaret Shardlow

Report from Julie Briggs:

Originally Fenstanton and Hilton RBL were a Sub Branch of St Ives RBL, but after reorganisation we now come under Cambridgeshire umbrella. We are extremely small in number so do not have a committee, but Margaret and I do attend St Ives Branch and Women's Section meetings. Even so if you join Fenstanton and Hilton RBL you can also join St Ives or any other Branch without any further cost. The annual membership is £17.00.

Just to clarify you do not need to have been a member or be related to a member of the Armed forces to join the Royal British Legion. Similarly, you do not need to be a member of the RBL to be a Poppy Appeal Collector.

Activities of the Royal British Legion in this area include:

- Supporting retired and present members of the Armed Forces and their dependants. Our Welfare Officer Alan will contact or visit, when informed of a person who needs support. At the moment he only has Margaret and Monica Thompson who may continue with visits or telephone contact if the person needs company or help with shopping or such like. There are courses available to help prospective Welfare Supporters.
- Our Standard Bearer can be asked to attend a funeral of either retired or present Military personnel. Normally he is supported by other members of the legion. Last year it was wonderful to be asked to attend a Party to celebrate World War 2 Veteran Reginald Millns 100th Birthday, where Julie was the standard bearer.
- St Ives Women's Section are back to meeting on the second Monday of each month at the Ivy Leaf club in Broadleas at 11am. This is an opportunity to meet up and make friends whilst having a tea, coffee and biscuit sometimes cake.
- In the past there have been outings and joining other Huntingdonshire RBL Women's Sections to support their fund raising or join their celebratory party. These activities will start up again once restrictions and members feel comfortable to participate.
- Women's Section organise Poppy Bingo to support the annual Poppy Appeal.
- The St Ives Branch members meet monthly but purely to discuss business matters.
- Naturally RBL members will be contributing to the Platinum Jubilee celebrations in St Ives.

I had been Standard Bearer for the Fenstanton and Hilton RBL until autumn of last year, after sustaining an injury. We are extremely fortunate in that Michael Paver has volunteered to take my place.

So now membership of Fenstanton Hilton RBL consists of 3 of us: Margaret Shardlow, Michael Paver and myself. Granted there are no members living in Fenstanton, but I have

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arranged to speak at Fenstanton Parish Council next month. So please do think about at least enquiring about joining us. If you have any questions do please ask.

Hilton totally amazes Margaret and I each year by villagers' generosity during each Annual Poppy Appeal. Last year we had about 20 (actually 19) collectors, but more helpers are always welcome to lighten the load. A total of £1515.45 was raised last year.

Report from Margaret Shardlow:

She advised that she was going to provide an understanding of the poppy appeal year. In June/July, they order what they will need for the poppy appeal. Then in August/September they establish whether their collectors are carrying on. In October they get the boxes and tins out of Margaret's garage and ensure that they are filled and labelled correctly. This takes a whole day as it also has to be recorded on official forms and the numbers alter every year for security purposes. The boxes and tins are then delivered to collectors. After Remembrance Sunday they collect tins from collectors and conduct a supervised count of the money. Then the forms are completed, and tins packed away and the money is taken to Peterborough to be banked.

Report from the Hilton Rural Wildlife Conservation Group – Julie Briggs

The Group was formed in March 2001. The aims were to actively encourage wildlife within Hilton's boundaries. And encourage interest in the range of wildlife around us. A committee was formed. Our activities included

- Organising talks by our own and visiting speakers, sometimes walks around the village looking at tree species, fungi, Monach farm, visit to Paxton Pits to hear the Nightingale.
- Pat Graham our Chairman applied for grants to help purchase tools and insurance for our working parties, after gaining Hilton's PC to carry out these safely.
- Before starting Working Parties we invited Roland Fletcher, Ranger at Paxton Pits to demonstrate how to safely use our tools.
- We arranged fund raising events, fun quizzes, raffles, coffee mornings etc. to expand our range of tools and to keep up our insurance.

Things went very well with a lot of interest, but that declined when members moved away. Unfortunately, by March 2006 attendance at Working Parties, Talks had diminished, and the committee was greatly reduced. We decided to disband the Group. All funds were transferred to a deposit account.

Time passed and the funds stood at £1,000. Last year, as the last Chairman I discussed with the previous committee members what should be done with the funds, we had hoped that another group of villagers may like to form a similar group. We approached the Village Garden committee and Hilton Parish council for suggestions.

The Village Garden committee suggested planting wildflowers e.g., British Bluebells and Wild Garlic in several different areas. Heather asked Hilton PC for permission to plant these bulbs

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in the Grove next to the Playground. 100 British Bluebells and 50 Wild Garlic were ordered at a cost of £100.00, towards the end of January. Heather arranged for 10 members of the village Garden Group to plant the bulbs and have labelled the area. Thank you Heather and your helpers. Heather is waiting for permission to plant bulbs adjacent to the flyover the new A14. We are waiting to see if the bulbs establish before possibly ordering more for the Grove.

During discussions, the Late Dr Michael Way suggested we purchase a bench to be positioned by the bridge between the Wilderness and the football pitch. There had been a bench there previously until it was vandalised. We approached Hilton Parish Council with the offer of purchasing a recycled plastic bench, in keeping with the ethos of the Conservation Group, and asking their permission for the bench to be positioned on the Green. Hilton Parish Council stated that they wanted us to buy a stylish Oak bench for the purpose. The former members of the Conservation Group are refusing this and have asked Hilton Parish Council to reconsider our generous offer. Due to the restraints of Parish Council legislation this matter cannot be revisited by Hilton Parish council until May this year.

Report from Hilton Feast Week Committee – Nicola Webster – Chair

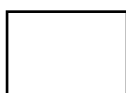

Report from Hilton Village Hall Management Committee – Liz Bush – Chair (read by Cllr Peter Balicki)

The last year has continued to have its challenges for the Village Hall Committee, as it has for all charitable groups. The Village Hall was eventually able to re-open its doors in September 2021, having been closed since March 2020 due to COVID restrictions. We were very pleased to welcome back the majority of our hirers, with some new groups joining us, which is always encouraging.

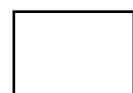
Fund-raising generally is certainly not back to its pre-COVID status, and the Village Hall Committee continue to actively apply for and have been successful with receiving grant funding support for the general upkeep and running of our public buildings.

The festive season allowed us to again celebrate Christmas as a community, with another magnificent Christmas tree, very generously donated by a Hilton villager and festooned with lights, proudly standing as a beacon of hope for normal times to return. One of our



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Committee members scripted and directed another incredibly successful pantomime for the total enjoyment of the village and the monies raised are going to the upgrade of our courtyard garden – hopefully in time for the Platinum Jubilee this summer – many thanks to Helen and Ken Attwood for this huge improvement to the Village Hall.

We have many plans for improvements and events as we slowly re-open to full capacity for the village and look forward to welcoming you all to some of our Platinum Jubilee events in June.

Report from Hilton Action on Traffic (HAT) – Ken Attwood

I would just like to explain who HAT are and what we stand for. Many of you will never have heard of us but we were formed by a chap who had a passion about getting a full-time ban put into place and being in place when we got the partial ban, also for getting the speed limit reduced from 40 to 30mph. His name is Bill Halford and many here will remember Bill as a village stalwart and when left to live on the East coast HAT continued to work on the traffic related issues. HAT was at the fore in helping to get the crossing installed and I spent many an hour watching the traffic during school times to help provide the data for the initial request for it to be installed.

HAT was responsible for the application to the County Council for LHI bid to get the money for the SID devices which are now in use daily monitoring the traffic flow and speeds throughout the village and like Bill Halford another stalwart was responsible for that bid and the collection of the data every week come rain or shine along with the battery changes and that's Andy Bush. Without his tenacity and drive to get the devices we would not have had the data so vital in the Parish councils bid to get the Lorry Ban for which we are all so looking forward to.

Where does HAT go from here now we have the ban in progress, well we will continue to create data for the various schemes which will inevitably come our way, like a 30 MPH limit across the green and ultimately if it is needed a 20mph limit through the village. Road safety will never go away, and neither will HAT.
